Questions:

1. PRIORITIES: What are your top three state legislative priorities and how would you address them?

A: Education, Incomes, and Infrastructure. Education - All Michigan children deserve the opportunity to develop a skill that can sustain them in the 21st century economy. We need to improve access to quality early-childhood and pre-K education, and make post-secondary training affordable. Incomes - Michiganders who work full time should be able to support themselves. We must increase the minimum wage to \$12/hr., reinstate the earned-income tax credit, support the Healthy Michigan Plan, and strengthen collective bargaining rights. Infrastructure - Increase revenue dedicated to building a world class infrastructure.

2. EDUCATION: What measures do you support/propose to achieve improved educational outcomes and accessibility for Michigan students from early childhood through post-secondary education?

A: Educating our young so that they have the opportunity to reach their full potential is our most basic responsibility, but we have fallen far behind other states in public education outcomes. Michigan needs a universal pre-K program so that all children are prepared to succeed no matter what community they live in. We need to reinvest in our public schools and make teaching an attractive career again in order to attract and retain great teachers. Finally we need to have multiple paths for post-secondary education including training in skilled trades, apprenticeships, and colleges that are affordable to every family.

3. ECONOMY: What policies do you support to increase jobs and help Michigan residents improve their economic positions?

A: My vision is that any Michigander who works full time should be able to support themselves. Higher wages are directly correlated to higher educational attainment. In order to compete in the 21st century economy we need a trained and talented workforce. Therefore, all Michigan workers need to have access to affordable post-secondary education whether it be training in the skilled trades, or obtaining a college degree. In addition, we must increase the minimum wage to \$12/hr., reinstate the earned-income tax credit, support the Healthy Michigan Plan, and strengthen collective bargaining rights.

4. ELECTIONS: What state policies do you support regarding campaign funding and voting rights?

A: My vision is a Michigan where everyone's vote counts equally. We simply must eliminate gerrymandering, the self-serving practice of politicians drawing favorable legislative districts for their own advantage. Redistricting must be taken out of the hands of the legislators and given to a non-partisan citizen panel. Michigan will never have fair elections until this is accomplished. We also need to repeal the legislation passed in 2017 (SB 335) which allows Michigan politicians to raise unlimited amounts of dark-money for Super PACs that support their campaigns.

5. ENVIRONMENT & ENERGY: What actions or policies do you support to protect Michigan's water, air and land for current and future generations, while meeting the state's energy needs? Explain how those actions or policies would affect the future of Enbridge Pipeline 5.

A: We can have both a healthy economy and a healthy environment. We don't have to choose. I will support the transition of Michigan to renewable energy which will bring jobs to northern and rural Michigan. I will demand stringent inspections for Enbridge line 5 until it can be removed. I will introduce legislation to repeal SB 652, which effectively put protection of the environment into the hands of industry executives. I will also protect our public lands and water from being sold or developed so that current and future generations will continue to have access to hunt, fish, camp and play on unspoiled public land.

6. JUSTICE: What policies will you pursue to promote social and racial justice in our state?

A: As a state senator representing the 36th district, my highest priority will be to stand up for the forgotten and struggling citizens of central and northern Michigan.

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
